
Briefing Summary

Divergently Together is a socially engaged creative project that uses technology to support disabled and neurodivergent communities to take part in climate action.

We are building a shared island community of neurodivergent individuals from Cavan, Fermanagh and Omagh. This community will come together to co-design creative responses to the climate emergency.

We are looking for neurodivergent participants from Cavan and Fermanagh Omagh to take part in a series of workshops from February - July 2025. There will be 10 workshops in total, offering opportunities for participants to collaborate, share ideas, and co-create a response to the climate crisis.

Project Overview

Divergently Together is a project that helps disabled and neurodivergent people take part in climate action. The project aims to make climate action fairer and more inclusive by challenging stereotypes about disability and neurodiversity.

Climate change affects disabled people in many ways. For example, weather warnings are not always easy to understand, and some health conditions make extreme weather harder to manage. This means that disabled people often struggle to stay safe and get the support they need in climate plans.

Disabled and neurodivergent people also have important skills and ideas that can help solve big challenges like climate change. Resilience, creativity, and problem-solving abilities are key to finding new ways to tackle climate issues.

Divergently Together will bring together disabled and neurodivergent people in a series of workshops from February – July 2025. In these workshops, participants will work together to create ideas and solutions to the climate crisis. The workshops will be both online and in-person, giving everyone a chance to share and collaborate. The goal is to make climate action more inclusive and effective, with participants playing a key role in shaping the solutions.



Project Lead

AlanJames Burns, is a neurodivergent, environmental and audiovisual artist, curator and festival maker producing interactive, socially engaged and site-specific projects. The focal points of their highly collaborative practice are disability, climate emergency and a just society.

By coming together, we can share ideas, learn from one another, and create a community that's focused on making climate action more fair and inclusive.




